### Whither Pews News?

The use of the limited space available in Pews News requires the exercise of judgment. Once the minimum of content - service details, Collect and Readings, and essential contacts - has been accommodated, any remaining space can be used for the printing of notices and of publicity for events within the Benefice. The practicalities of printing dictate that space comes in units of two pages, so that a typical issue can consist either of a single folded A4 sheet, making four pages, two sheets, making eight pages, or a halfway house of six pages made up of a folded sheet plus an A5 insert. In recent weeks, responding to the varying lengths of readings, and to the varying volume of requests to publish notices, all three formats have been used, but the editor endeavours to adhere to a standard, set by the Ministry Team at the beginning of this year, of one sheet plus an insert, making six pages in all. An economy measure of colour on front and back pages only was imposed, and even colour was eschewed in Lent out of respect for the season.

This week the essential material could not easily be accommodated in four pages, so the editor, needing to fill six, emailed some regular contributors, using the bcc device to protect their identities, inviting further material. There was an immediate response from one recipient strongly advocating a return to a "pre-pandemic" format, pointing out correctly that the format inherited by the present editor, and subsequently modified by the Ministry Team, was a provisional and temporary one that, in the writer's opinion, could and should be abandoned with church congregations returning to "normal" worship.

The editor is open to change, but subject to these considerations:

- (a) the existence of those (who at present include himself, though that is by the by) who are unable for health or mobility reasons to attend church regularly or at all, and rely on Pews News and the streamed services,
- (b) it is widely acknowledged that few if any aspects of our personal, social and business lives will revert to a pre-pandemic "normal", whatever that was, and
- (c) our new incumbent may well wish to make changes, and these should not perhaps be pre-empted by radical change now.

These are matters for the church community as a whole, through the Ministry Team. The views of any one individual are to be respected, but need not and should not be binding. Other readers may wish to offer their own views, either through contributions to these pages, or direct to the Ministry Team, whose instructions your editor will carry out to the best of his ability. Alternatively he is ready to stand down in favour of a successor who can better command your support.

For the record, two pages of A5 cost 1p to print, with an additional cost per sheet of paper of roughly 0.7p. For the standard print run of 67 copies plus 6 large print copies, this amounts to a total additional cost to the Benefice of about £1.25 for each extra two pages. This editor feels that Pews News, like the BBC in the words of its founder, Lord Reith, should "educate, entertain and inform". Others may disagree. Is there a debate to be had - perhaps with our eventual new incumbent?

# The Easter Rising.

The tension caused by Irish Republicans, who had wanted an independent Ireland for many years, came to a head on Sunday April 24<sup>th,</sup> 1919, when they seized the General Post Office in Dublin. They were led by Patrick Pease and Tom Clarke who had formed a Citizens' Army. The British army and police were called in to repel them and much violence ensued lasting for a week. In the process 493 people were killed including 260 civilians, 140 police and military and 67 rebels, and 14 of the leaders including Pease and Clarke, were executed. There were over 2000 injured.

Can violence ever be justified?

# Reflection for Sunday 27th March 2022, Easter 2, written by Sue Egerton

Poor old 'doubting' Thomas, he gets a bit of a bad press doesn't he?

Well, particularly in this era of fake news and biased reporting of any event, I can relate to Thomas. I too, like to actually see or hear for myself something incredible happening, rather than just accepting what someone else says. A bit like actually seeing the 'northern lights' and not just hearing from those who report seeing them. Or hearing for myself the sound of wind blowing through the trees, not just the weather report which says it's going to be windy!

We've just heard that Thomas' friends say to him 'We have seen the Lord'.

Just imagine how he feels. He's just seen his best friend betrayed and barbarically killed and buried and then heard the stories of the women at the tomb who tell that Jesus is risen; Mary even met him!

Thomas may remember some of Jesus' words to all the disciples;- about tearing down the temple and raising it again on the third day; but he's never really understood what Jesus was on about. And now, his friends are telling him this incredible story about Jesus coming to meet them as they were together in a locked room. So, when the other disciples tell him 'We have seen the Lord', Thomas' reply is 'Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe.'

Maybe, as a twin, Thomas was used to mistaken identity and needed reassurance that what the other disciples told him had happened, really **had** happened.

We don't know why he wasn't with the other disciples when Jesus appeared to them and I imagine he's pretty fed up about it. He's missed something incredible. And then there's a whole week of nothing going on. During this time, the remarkable thing is that Thomas is still with the others, worshipping and praying, eating and sleeping. He does appear to have believed them in some way and, together with them, he's waiting for what happens next. Maybe he feels something along the lines of 'I'll be able to take this in properly only when I see it for myself.'

So Thomas doesn't sulk and stamp his feet because he's been left out, he commits to staying with the disciples until faith leads to sight. It turns out to take a week, but he sticks it out. This behaviour reminds us of the commitment he displayed when Jesus was about to walk into danger by going to Lazarus' tomb, Thomas said: 'Let us go also, that we may die with him'. That level of allegiance and faith would not be abandoned easily, especially when people he trusts are reporting that Jesus has appeared to them alive. Maybe he simply needs time to 'get his head round it' and until then he's carried by their testimony.

He spends this week thinking about the implications of what his friends told him and what he learnt from Jesus so that, when Jesus does appear to him and offers the opportunity to see and feel his hands and side, Thomas is able to respond with a glorious affirmation of his faith, 'My Lord and my God'.

Thomas makes the most positive and instantaneous response of any of those that Jesus revealed himself to.

We are all commissioned as the disciples were some 2000 years ago to share the good news of God's love with every one we meet. And we can all experience Jesus everyday in those we meet when we share a greeting, a handshake (or elbow bump), a kind word, reassurance, love. After all, as a sixteenth century St Theresa of Avila recognised:-

'Christ has no body now but yours.

No hands, no feet on earth but yours.

Yours are the eyes through which he looks compassion on this world.

Yours are the feet with which he walks to do good.

Yours are the hands through which he blesses all the world.

Yours are the hands, yours are the feet, yours are the eyes, you are his body.

Christ has no body now on earth but yours.'

Just as doubting and questioning didn't separate Thomas from his faith and belief in Jesus, so our doubts and questions don't separate us from our faith and belief in Jesus. Instead, by simply taking that bit longer to explore our faith, we can be like Thomas and echo him as we say 'My Lord and my God'.
